

Spitting facts about Spiti- Your next travel destination...



Travelling is a privilege but travelling solo is another kind of privilege. Sitting among strangers, climbing mountains and navigating valleys on your own is an exhilarating experience. This new year, I went for a solo trip to Spiti Valley. A place so beautiful that describing it in words feels like writing on water. As the name suggests, Spiti means "the middle land", and it is the land between Tibet and India. Some of the prominent side-valleys in Spiti are the Pin valley and the Lingti valley.

A trip to Spiti should ideally include stays at different villages on high altitudes giving you time to acclimatize to the atmospheric pressure. Starting from Sangla, Nako to Kaza village which is on the highest altitude and return via Kalpa village. As it was a solo trip, I got the chance to make friends who were strangers at the start of the trip. Going to Spiti is nothing short of an adventure, filled with thrill, excitement and obviously low oxygen levels. One may not find many options when it comes to fancy food, but the place offers a variety of local food and cuisine which has its own unique taste. The place has some nice homestays to offer with locals being one of the warmest hosts. The temperature is at the lowest which means sometimes reaching -20 °C, so one has to be covered in layers at all times.

Although I was travelling solo, I was not alone. I was travelling with a group of 45 fellow backpackers, and a lot of them, just like me, were also travelling solo. Navigating around the valley and trekking to the tough spots with them didn't feel like a challenge because of all the fun we had together.

Spiti is beautiful, not destroyed by the ill effects of tourism yet. It offers the cleanest air to breathe in (whenever the oxygen levels are not too low of course), snow covered mountains as well as high barren mountains with sparse vegetation. It is a place that one should go to clear their mind, connect to one's soul and live in the moment.


